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"What Are You Looking For?"



Last Sunday was Baptism of the Lord Sunday and we looked at Matthew's account of the baptism of Jesus. We discovered that of the four gospels, it's only Matthew who includes the dia-PASTOR logue that takes place between John the Baptist and Jesus. The other accounts

are different from his.

This Sunday, we'll take a look at one of the other accounts of that event that is also different – in a different way. John's gospel is generally quite different from all three of the others – Matthew, Mark and Luke. The primary reason for that is that Mark serves as the first gospel and Matthew and Luke quite obviously had some version of his when they were writing theirs. John's, however, seems to stand on its own and takes a very different approach.

This is evident in his account of the baptism of Jesus. It's rather fascinating to see how he tells the story. He does so after the fact. In other words, he tells us the story by having John the Baptist share his recollection of the event with his own followers. It ends up being a fascinating way of looking at, not only the baptism of Jesus, but also the way the first disciples ended up following him.

Read John 1:29-42 where we find Jesus asking a very provocative question that we should all consider – "What Are You Looking For?"



Where He Leads Me I Will Follow Bible Studies As we continue our theme of learning "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow," where can we find better example of people following God leading than in the lives of the disciples. Where can we find a better example of people walking in faith through open doors

than when the disciples began to establish the early church as found in the Acts of the Apostles.

Perhaps that is why all three of our Adult Sunday School classes chose to study the Acts of the Apostles for the beginning of the new year.

Teacher of the Pioneer Class, Jim Van Cleave, meeting in room 101 states:

"The book of Acts is full of the energy and excitement of the early Christians as they found God doing new things all over the place. They spread this Good News of Jesus all around the world. Acts shows the joy, conflicts, puzzles and problems that confronted the early church. These same problems and celebrations are found in contemporary churches.

Luke presented this story where Jesus is the principle actor in a play where the action on the stage crucially depends on a person whom the audience never actually sees. A play where the audience finds themselves in the middle of the action. There is no ending to the play because the story is still being written as we are part of this never ending story."

Teacher of the adult class meeting in room 205, Rev. Dennis Davenport, began his classes new study by looking at passages from Acts last Sunday. He says his class "will be engaged in "Revision" that challenges us to look at who we are as a church and what really matters to us – individually and corporately. We'll be examining various aspects of our faith to determine what's essential, what's equivocal and what's expendable.

Following that study, we will perhaps be moving into a series entitled "Becoming a Good Samaritan," based on a video series featuring as wide-ranging a group of individuals as can possibly be imagined. The series will feature both theological, political and social conservatives and liberals who all share a common commitment to Jesus Christ that compels them to act in His name in a variety of ways. Throughout it all, we will be challenged to examine who we are as Christians and how we are living out our faith in our daily lives.

The Eastminster 201 Sunday School Class teacher Mike Lee, will also be leading in a study of Acts using the William Barclay Commentary. Mike says, "Using various resources, we look forward to having hearty discussions on the subject of Acts, Luke's role in writing Acts and how that affected the early church. Feel free to join us in room 201 as we dive in to one of the most important books of the Bible."

Why not join one of these classes this Sunday? A chair, a smile and a warm welcome await vou. All classes meet each Sunday at 9 a.m. and last for one hour. Bibles will be provided if needed.

Spiritual boundaries help us to distinguish God's will from our own and give us renewed awe for our Creator.

Often, Christians focus so much on being loving and unselfish that they forget their own limits and limitations. We will be offering a 1 hour, 9 week course that provides biblically-based answers on how to set healthy boundaries with our parents, spouses, children, friends, co-workers, and even ourselves.
