The point of the title listed above is to be sure that we don't get too caught up in focusing on C.S. Lewis and miss the real purpose of our worship. Lewis himself would cringe at the thought of being the focus of Christian

One reason for asking David to preach this week is because he's done extensive study of Lewis, both in college and in seminary. Along with the outstanding job that Bart & Marlene Huffaker did in leading our combined Sunday School class this past week, I think David can help us prepare for what we'll experience with our visit from C. S. Lewis presented by Kevin Radaker.

Lewis was arguably (some would claim *clearly*) the most influential Christian writer of the 20th century. Whether you're familiar with his writings or not, this would be a good week and Lent would be a good season to spend some time reading one or more of his books. Mere Christianity is the most well-known and even if you've read it once or even more than once, it never gets old. The seven -volume Chronicles of Narnia series is for adults as much as it is for children – or perhaps, more accurately, for children as much as it is for adults.

Greetings from the Community and World Missions Committee! We would like to update you on some of our ongoing and planned activities. Our annual Blood Drive will be on Sunday, April 30. April 23 will be another great Sunday opportunity to help our youth. A Spaghetti Luncheon will be held after church on that day with proceeds going to sup-

Eastminster Mission House WHAT A MINISTRY YOU PROVIDE!



One of the most significant ministries of our congregation over the past decade has been our Mission House. For those of us who have seen, over the vears, how important the house is to those who have lived there, it's easy to

forget that some members of the congregation don't recognize its value. In case you've forgotten and never knew, here's a quick synopsis of the history our Mission House.

In November 2006, a congregational meeting was held to act on a recommendation to purchase the mission house. using approximately \$90,000 of funds that had been committed to missions from our capital campaign for building the gallery & making other needed repairs to our facility. If, at any time in the future, we would choose to sell the house, the proceeds would return to the mission budget since that's where they came from initially.

The use of the house is for those in emergency situations with a priority being given to Habitat families awaiting the completion of their new home.

Tenants pay \$300 rental per month plus utilities, which usually average another \$300. The rental charge enables us to make necessary repairs without impacting the church budget. The amount cannot be higher for rental because we can't, by law, make a profit on the house.

On July 1, 2007, we had an open house for members of the congregation to see the house for the first time & view renovations & repairs that had been made.

In September, 2007, Scott & Nicole Toone and their 3 daughters moved into the mission house as they were awaiting the completion of their habitat house. The Toones lived there until February of 2008.

Just one month later, March of 2008, Brenda & Brenda moved in while they, too, were awaiting the completion of their habitat house.

When they left, there was a brief time of vacancy until the Tsianguebenis from Nigeria moved in, Pierre being a new teacher at Bosse.

In late spring, 2012, Mike, Jenna & Carson Lee moved in after their home had been destroyed by fire and they were there until they were able to find new housing.

In February, 2014, Sasha and Jackson Patel moved into the Mission House and were there until they were able to find and afford new housing.

Since we gave priority to families awaiting the completion of their Habitat house, that's where we turned when the Mission House again became vacant.

A Habitat of Evansville staff member told us of a young man who, though he did not qualify yet for a Habitat house, was in a very difficult situation. Andreas was a student and an Iraqi War veteran and through circumstances beyond his control, was soon going to be without any housing at all. We quickly readied the Mission House and the day before Andreas would have been homeless, he was able to move in and he has been with us since last fall. Every time he comes to the office to pay his rent, Andreas expresses his profound gratitude and astonishment at the kindness and love that have been shown to him by this congregation.

As we consider the profound impact that has been made upon the lives of all those who have lived in our Mission House, it is quite clear that the decision we made a decade ago was the right one. It was clearly a step of faith, trusting that God would somehow use us and use that house to touch people's lives. It has proven to be far more profound and meaningful than any of us could possibly have imagined.

There are many in our community who know Eastminster more because of that tremendous ministry that we provide than for anything else that we do. As we look to the future, we can only trust that for many generations to come, we will continue to be able to touch lives by offering a safe, affordable place to live for those who find themselves in difficult circumstances.
