First Sunday in Lent "Beasts & Angels"

This Sunday is the first Sunday of the season we call Lent. It finds its name from a word that means "lengthening of days" or, spring.

Lent is the period of time between Ash Wednesday (February 14 this year) and Easter (April 1 this year). It lasts 40 days, not counting Sundays.

40 is a significant number in the Bible. Think of its importance in the Old Testament. It rained for 40 days and 40 nights during the Flood. Moses spent 40 days on Mt. Sinai. The Israelites wandered in the wilderness for 40 years.

In the New Testament, Jesus was in the wilderness for 40 days during the period of temptation after his baptism. This is the 40 that is most significant as we consider the 40 days of Lent. We commemorate that time in the wilderness when Jesus was tempted and challenged. That's why Lent is considered a time of introspection, a period of 6 weeks when we're called to reflect upon our own lives and the way in which we find ourselves challenged and tempted. We're called to reflect on the way in which Jesus made it through that difficult time and emerged better prepared to carry out his divine mission.

The season of Lent always begins with a look at this story – the temptation of Jesus. Interestingly, when we look at it in Mark's gospel, it's significantly different from what we find in Matthew and Luke. With the time we're spending in Mark, we're becoming accustomed to his quick-paced approach to everything and this story is no different. To read Mark's account, you might conclude that the time Jesus spent in the wilderness lasted about 40 minutes instead of 40 days!

Read Mark 1:5-9 where Mark tells us that, in the wilderness with Jesus, there were both "Beasts & Angels."

It is funny how things change over time. Adam and I used to make handmade Valentines every year. We even did it when he first went to elementary school. I enjoyed it so much, but I think I cared more about it than he did. In some ways, as terrible as this sounds and I don't even want to write it, I liked to be the mom who sent in handmade valentines. Like somehow that earned me a gold 'mom' star. But, now I am older and wiser (maybe). And, as an older and somewhat wiser mom, I went to a lovely store that sells all sorts of perfectly lovely valentines in lovely boxed sets. I bought candy valentines for Adam and Ninja Turtle valentines for Evan and I was done. No cutting. No gluing. Nothing. Are they good enough? Sure they are. Am I?
