"Psalm 27"

In preparation for the service this week I encourage you all to individually study Psalm 27. We know that this psalm was written by David, a man who contributed more psalms than anyone else. Often David's psalms were inspired by desperation and pain, and through this we gain a very intimate understanding of what faith in God means.

As I prepare for this sermon I keep asking myself, "What do you want most?" As you read this psalm I believe it would benefit you to ask yourself the same question. For me my answer depends on the time of day. Sometimes it's to put a stop to all the violence in the news, and other times it is just to find the nearest bathroom. In verse 5, however, David gives a far more spiritual answer.

David wishes only to serve his God. In good times and in bad, David unapologetically expresses his faithfulness to the Lord. Despite his difficulties, David's faith in God gave him the confidence he needed to overcome life's challenges, it gave him the perspective that we all need to devote ourselves to God's plan for us, and it gave him the patience he needed to operate on Gods time and not his own.

NEWBURGH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH CROSS

The members of the former Newburgh Presbyterian Church are happy to see the legacy of the cross live on at Eastminster Presbyterian Church, our new home. The Cross served as a focal point of worship in the sanctuary at Newburgh Presbyterian Church since November 21st of 1976. Created by Mr. Joe Brock, the cross consists of over 500 irregular shaped brass plates with copper strips linking them together. Each plate was cut by hand and hammered into a concave shape that was signed and dated by members of the church in 1976. The cross is over fourteen feet in height and six feet in width.

This past week, through the joint efforts of NPC and Eastminster, the cross was erected on the east wall of the Fellowship Hall. It will serve not only as a legacy for Newburgh Presbyterian Church but also a symbol of the brotherhood of our congregations and the new hope in God through our collective worship. Information on the history of the cross will be available near the cross.



FROM OUR DIRECTOR of MUSIC

I have a confession to make: picking the music for each Sunday takes much more time for me than it actually should. I could proclaim that it's because I spend time studying, analyzing, and reflecting upon the lectionary readings (which I do), but that is not the primary reason. Nor is it because I am looking at making musical connections from week to week - those are merely happy accidents. The plain truth is that whatever I plan I know I will spend the rest of the week singing or humming as I go about my daily life.

Perhaps it is because I spend my days teaching music at UE, but the music in my head never really quiets down. Sometimes it's at the forefront of my thoughts, but most of the time it is quiet background noise. At first, it was a bit disconcerting to get to Thursday and realize I'm still singing last Sunday's closing hymn. Then I remember 1 Thessalonians 5:17, "Pray without ceasing," and I can't help but smile. What is a hymn but a sung prayer? In the middle of a stressful day, the hymn and its lyrics provide quiet refuge and a chance for reflection upon God's Word.

From the very beginnings of the Reformation, congregational singing in the vernacular was an important part of worship. Singing was used to teach the people the texts of the Scripture as well as reinforce important theological ideas. Popular songs were reconfigured with texts from the Bible with rhyming couplets. The hymns were designed to remain in the worshipper's head long after the service ended. I take comfort in this as I find myself humming the refrain from "On Eagle's Wing" for possibly the 50th time since we sang it on Sunday. As you go through your week, I hope the hymns that play on repeat in your head are sources of reflection and not consternation.

I would be remiss if I did not mention that if you find yourself singing throughout the week, please consider joining choir. We are always welcoming new members and would love to have you join us.


