Because We Love You! Luncheon





PASTOR'S REPORT

In case you have been unable to pick up a copy of the Annual Report, here is Pastor Scott's portion of that.

This is my first report to the Eastminster Congregation. It has been a pleasure serving you for these last few months. I have spent my time getting to know you and assessing the needs that are here. The next phase is to work with the Mission Study Group to lead the congregation in examining who we are and what we need to be. At its January meeting the session appointed seven people to the Mission Study Group. These are-Allen Helmstetter, Stacie Schalasky, Mark Miller, Chris Kuhs, Dan Irmscher, Ian Garcia, and Corev Fritz. This committee is tasked with hearing from vou, helping the congregation assess its mission. and get ready for new leadership. Be prepared for surveys, fellowship hall meetings, and personal contacts. You will see some things that we can put into practice now and others that can wait till new leadership. This is your ministry and the congregation Calls a minister not the Session. So please let this group hear from you.

I have been asked "how long will it take to Call a new minister?" My response to that is, "as long as it takes". We will try to keep the congregation informed on where we are in the process. Here is an outline of the process as I know it:

- 1. Hiring an Interim Minister Accomplished on September 1, 2019
- 2. Session appoints a mission study committee-Accomplished on January 22, 2020
- 3. Mission Study Committee surveys the congregation In process
- 4. A Mission Study document is generated and submitted to session and the COM of presbytery for approval Yet to be Achieved
- 5. The congregation elects a Pastor Nominating Committee Yet to be achieved
- 6. The search begins Yet to be achieved
- 7. A candidate is presented to the congregation for a vote Yet to be achieved
- 8. The new pastor is installed Yet to be achieved

Interim ministry is one of the only places where the object is to work yourself out of a job. I look forward to helping this congregation to determine its direction and find new pastoral leadership.



I have taught 3rd through 5th grade Sunday School since my son, Keaton, was in 3rd grade, and he's now 25. This year all but one of my regularly attending kids was moving into middle school. But, at that time, we had no teacher for the middle school class. So after talking to Erin and the kids, we decided the kids going into middle school would just stay with me. However, I didn't think it was fair to our now 6th grade kids to not get to be promoted in some way. So we decided to move our class into the Middle School Classroom down the hall. Erin helped me find curriculum and the very first lesson was on Creation. So I decided we would do some of our own creating in our new room. First, we picked out a name for our new room. The kids came up with probably 20 options and then voted on what it would be called. Some Place Else was the winner. We also needed new artwork on the walls. We decided to do Faith. Hope and Love in crayon art. Karen and I brought in our hairdryers to melt the crayons, and the kids worked on the art over the course of two Sundays. We actually blew a fuse the first day, which the kids thought was hilarious. Fortunately, it was only our classroom. The kids seem to love their new room, especially the couches. We've moved through the Old Testament and now are studying the ministry of Jesus. It is such a joy and blessing to teach these kids and to watch their faith develop. We have wonderful discussions that sometimes get us way off track, but oftentimes they open my eyes to see something in a way I hadn't thought of before. Bible Memory Work

Memory books will be made available soon for you to pick up. Being familiar with scripture is a valuable gift we can give our children and youth. Let's work together to help them build a firm foundation of faith for their lives!
