It was late as we pulled into the US Forest Service campsite somewhere in southeastern Colorado. We had to set up our tents and then cook our meals with light

provided only by flashlight. The next day we were scheduled to begin the back country phase of our camping trip in the Chalk Creek Pass. So the next morning came far too early. Most of us were tired, worn out from traveling cross-country by van, and too little sleep. We were roused by Dick Ryman, our leader and my mentor. We prepared our camp breakfast, struck the tents, and were ready to pile back into the van for the next bit of driving. As was our custom ,we began with a prayer, most often led by Dick.

Within the prayer he thanked God for the "rest of the night."

When I heard that phrase, I assumed he was thankful for the scant hours of sleep after all we had been through. I kind of heard him give thanks for the "remainder" of the night. I did not feel particularly rested, nor did I feel that thankful. But Dick kept using that same phrase in subsequent prayers, thanking God for the rest people took during the night. Then I realized that is what he was thankful for, having received refreshment through stillness and sleep, no matter how lengthy or brief. It was a good lesson/reminder that it is always important to be grateful, even if you feel you don't have much. Whether it is sleep, resources, patience, whatever we lack, it is important to be thankful for what we have. All life is a gift from God.
