"So much of our beliefs and behaviors are rooted in stories-narratives that are personal, familial, societal, cultural, and religious. We have subconsciously absorbed and actively constructed many money stories.

This stewardship series invites us to tease apart these overlapping narratives, to claim and recreate our stories in light of the stories we find in scripture. Throughout our theme and resource creation, I've experienced a shift in my own personal narrative around money. I've found clarity regarding the areas of my money story that hold tension or heaviness. I've experienced a release that has sparked in me a renewed desire to let my life truly reflect my theological beliefs about giving and justice. Behaviors change when the stories we tell ourselves are transformed."

Focal Scripture for this week:

RELEASE

Matthew 19:16-22 Deuteronomy 15:1-11

This week we practice release of shame, anxiety, guilt, greed or anything that keeps us from freedom and wholeness. We release the elements of our money story that prevent us from fully living into God's story. In Matthew, we see a man grieved to let go of his wealth. In Deuteronomy, we find the radical social mandate of cancelled debts, a communal release that is practiced for the good of all. Releasing is a spiritual practice that frees us from ourselves and liberates others.

The Parlor

For those new to Eastminster or those who just have not had the opportunity to explore the building, please take the time at some point to visit the Parlor. It is down the hallway out of the kitchen, to the right. (No food or drinks, please.)

Furnished and maintained by funds from the Memorial Committee, the Parlor is a formal setting which provides a quiet venue for meditation or conversation, and is

comfortable for small group meetings. It has in the past been referred to as the "Brides Room", and still serves that purpose for weddings today.

The China cabinet and hutch and a portion of the crystal and glassware in the open shelves came to us with the Washington Avenue members. The beautiful items in the China cabinet are in memory of women who were leaders in their women's association and are titled with their names.

The tall case clock was donated by the late Bob and Virginia Glascock and is maintained for us by our member Richard Yeager, who is a skilled clocksmith.

The open shelves contain mementoes of the Eastminster congregation, gathered over the years but unidentified. Other items of the crystal and glassware in addition to those from the Washington avenue members, are a collection from Eastminster, plus now from the Newburgh members. Also from that congregation, we now have a painting of the original Newburgh Presbyterian Church building (which still stands on State Street and is now maintained by the Historical Society). Also on the shelves are many books – theological studies, reference works, and Bible study guides, and these are for your use. There is no check-out system. Simply be mindful to return any item so that it is available to others.

The lower cabinets, just like home, are a storage and collection area. Of interest, one of the lower cabinets contains photo albums docu-

menting Eastminster activities during the 1980'S and 90's, compiled by a member who was active during those years.
